



<p>Welcome and Introductions, Debbie Field</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • This meeting was to bring everyone’s resources together to make a greater impact on prevention efforts on issues that affect our state. • The UDETC's Law Enforcement Partner of the Year Awards was presented at the Northwest Alcohol Conference to Jermaine Galloway and Jared Olson for their accomplishments in EUDL. 	
<p>Surveillance Data, Nathan Drashner</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The Surveillance Data system is going to be our main source of data moving forward. This System has correlation, but not causation. It will have twenty indicators and variables coming from the Department of Education, H&W, ISP, drunken driving data, etc., and will show the economic conditions of the community. The data will show the regions and locations that have the most problems in comparison to other counties and comparison with the National average. Currently, the overall variables show that we are better off, for the most part, than most of the nation. • The System will be ongoing, so besides the baseline study, it will have longitudinal data. This data will be used to drive our decision-making as far as to: 1) what sort of projects we can look into, 2) within the project what we need to focus on and 3) what issues we need to really pay attention to and 4) who do we need to sit down with and have a guided discussion with? • A website is being built that will be the State’s Substance Use Disorder Data and Research Repository. When this website is finished, there will be a link to it on ODPs website! 	

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<p>Intervention, “Toward No Drugs” (.5 ASAM criteria). Judge Varin would like the committee to explore the possibilities of expanding this program with SDFS.</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Last year Nancy Kunau was hired to do a pilot study in the 5th judicial counties of the areas of Twin Falls, Burley, Shoshone, Blaine County, Gooding and Jerome to look at the first time tobacco and alcohol citations with the parameters that surround it. She met with 140 individuals, interviewed them, gave them a survey and looked at 2800 citations which produced her data. The problem revealed that we are missing prevention and intervention links with teens. Many of the teens drink to cope and use alcohol to self-medicate and become isolated. The Judicial counties have now implemented four “Towards No Drugs” programs. • An Intervention program designed “Voices Specifically for Girls” and they learned that timing is critical in prevention efforts. • October will be changing how kids come into the system. Those kids will be served in a diversion court, headed by a judge, where they will do a SS upon the arrival of coming into court. There will be four themes: 1) immediacy, 2) engagement from model people (judges, etc), 3) education, 4) developing a relationship with these children and having a support group, which includes teaching them and their parents about consequences, and teaching children/family instructions on life and living.

Funding analysis 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Matt McCarter said it is very important for kids to be in school to minimize drugs/alcohol. • Matt McCarter explained how Safe and Drug Free Schools is funded. The formula for funding is measured by the average daily attendance which means more attendance which equals more money. The challenge to barrier of schools is improved treatment provider. Question, can we do most effective prevention programs in a light version? Opportunities come when people don’t make their funding choices off the data. Volunteer people need direction on how to do this, however, not much allocation to do this. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Bob Clements to create a “Best Practice” budget showing <u>if</u> we did all the compliance checks and levels at the recommended level before the next meeting.

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	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • In order to create a Unified Idaho Prevention System, we need to channel our efforts together to create a vision and mission to help in all these areas and combine our money to do this which is: 1) Promote consolidation; 2) identify what can happen at a low-cost range making it doable for people, 3) implement low-cost training to come to Idaho, 4) work with local judiciaries, 5) partner with education districts and judiciaries, 6) do road shows with judges, policy makers, people in the field, etc., in different areas and let them know what we are doing, 7) use GAIN SS for collecting information, 8) assess the needs within the communities and the whole state's resources thereby using good assessment on grants (Kim Osadchuk, a student intern working with the Office of Drug Policy, would be a good person to assess the state's resources, observe the grants, and evaluate the parameters to make grant comparisons). • Karen Des Aulnier suggested that all DOC coalitions to join CADCA as a state organization for \$500 yearly, which would give every coalition in the state membership, even those who have no money. Being a CADCA member would give them access to resources. The Office of Drug Policy may pay for \$500 to State to join this organization. • On September 15 we have Dr Ralph Hingson, Director Division of Epidemiology and Prevention Research, National Institute on Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism, Bethesda, MD as a speaker for the Pacific Northwest and Intermountain States Conference. He will be coming for a meeting with the coroners and medical examiners on what they capture during deaths for alcohol and drugs and wants to build a tool-kit here. We need to put together some of these road show components going out in the seven regions. All the directors in our interagency, along with coalitions, can support our defense and work together. • Matt would like to get to the place of budget settings for every district going forward. This will help to

Meaningful data is collected and analyzed on an on-going basis which drives system goals. • Problem Statement: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - we are not currently coordinated to achieve our potential collective impact. • Framework Model: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Communities That Care Risk and Protective Factor Model (Washington State) – includes Principals, Domains and Glossary <p>Review the Idaho Statewide Prevention Plan and identify some other components that we are missing.</p> <p>Priorities:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Regarding Parents Empowered packet that originated out of Utah, the SAMHSA Model programs was handed out as a list of Model programs to use for Effective Substance Abuse and Mental health Programs. • It was suggested that if we do a multiple base-line study that starts with the Utah program. The study would follow three closely related areas; do a pre-in post survey followed by a post survey which would give us a good best practice. • We need a strategic media campaign it should be: a) a one-piece comprehensive system, b) keep one message that we do for <u>everything</u>, that is sent to <u>everyone</u>, that we can all support.
