


Approximately 4,000 Idahoans 12 and older used heroin during the past year¹.




Idahoans 18-25 were more likely and those 12-17 were less likely to use heroin in the past year'.

The rate of heroin overdoses[‡] increased by 5x between 2002 and 2016⁵·




The percentage of Idahoans that used heroin in the past year increased by 38% between 2013 and 2016¹.

In 2015/2016, Idaho ranked 30th in the nation for past year heroin use among individuals 12 and older¹.

There were no significant differences in heroin use by region from 2014-2016².




Heroin arrests* have increased by 23x between 2007 and 20164.
